INTRODUCTION

The "Enemy Aliens" Research Guide provides an introduction to archival, library, museum and testimony holdings at the Vancouver Holocaust Education Centre related to the theme of "enemy alien" internment in Canada during the Second World War. This guide includes primary and secondary sources and recommended resources found at other organizations. Resources are linked directly to their catalogue records in the VHEC's collections database: collections.vhec.org.

Researchers wishing to access materials in person on-site are encouraged to review the Plan a Research Visit section of our website: collections.vhec.org/About/plan. Materials in the archives, museum and testimony collections are made available through an appointment by contacting: collections@vhec.org. The library is open to visitors during the VHEC's hours of operation.

Research guides are an introduction to a particular topic, theme or collection. They are not an exhaustive list of collection holdings; independent research is recommended and encouraged.

BACKGROUND

At the outbreak of the Second World War, Canada's restrictive and discriminatory immigration policies denied those seeking refuge, particularly Jews, entry into Canada. In 1940, Britain requested that Canada aid the war effort by taking in "enemy aliens" and prisoners of war. Canadian officials did not expect the approximately 2,300 civilian refugees from Nazism, most of them Jews, who applied to immigrate.

Of those deemed "enemy aliens" by Canada were German and Austrian citizens—Jewish and non-Jewish—between the ages of 16 and 60 who had found asylum in Britain only to be arrested under the suspicion of espionage. After a brief period of internment in England, they were deported to Canada and imprisoned in New Brunswick, Ontario and Quebec alongside political refugees and, in some camps, German prisoners of war.

On June 29, 1940, the first group of male internees arrived in Canada and was transported to various camps located throughout Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick. The Jewish internees spent months, even years, in all-male internment camps during the Second World War. They were not granted refugee status by the Canadian government until June 25, 1941. The refugees faced the injustice of internment with remarkable resilience and strived to make the most of their time behind barbed wire.

With the help of the Canada's Jewish community and other advocates, the Jewish refugees were eventually released. Students sponsored by community members, schools and yeshivas were released first, while others left as labourers or skilled professionals. The last of the refugees were released in 1943. Many of the Jewish refugees stayed in Canada, became Canadian citizens, and made enormous contributions to the nation.



Central Committee for Interned Refugees (CCIR)	A committee formed in January 1941 when the Canadian National Committee on Refugees (CNCR) and United Jewish Refugee and War Relief Agencies (UJRA) joined. The CCIR compiled individual case files that would facilitate release of internees in Canada.
United Jewish Refugee and War Relief Agencies (UJRA)	An umbrella organization of Jewish community organizations involved in refugee assistance in Canada and abroad, organized by the Canadian Jewish Congress (CJC) in 1939.

HOLOCAUST TESTIMONY

Testimony is a first-hand personal account of an event. A Holocaust survivor's testimony is microhistory, one person's story told from a specific and subjective perspective. Since most survivors are not historians, they will tell personal stories that will connect with the historical details acquired from other sources. Historians listen to testimony in order to understand the personal experiences of people who were involved in an historical event. When historians examine testimony as an historical source, they must carefully consider the challenges and the benefits that accompany the use of such testimonies. It is important to consider why survivors testify and under what circumstances.
